14. Reflection and Membership Updates

Over four hundred abstracts were submitted for the youth program and joint sessions in Toronto 2018, and this is an indicator that youth studies is a growing and increasingly networked field. It is good to see members from new areas, and particularly the growth in our MENA activity.

In the ISA World Forum and World Congress events, the contributions of participants continue to signal some of the cross-national issues of our times. For example in the 2016 Vienna ISA World Forum in Vienna, the largest number of applications converged on sessions about:

- Uncertainty and Precarity in Youth Employment:
- Young Skilled Migrants: Hopes and Struggles in New Global Trends
- Muslim Youth, Contemporary Challenges and Future Prospects

In Toronto the big issues are characterised by

- · Gender and Safety
- The way social change shapes young peoples transitions
- Possibilities for youth action and agency in a changing world

As seen here: a sociology for our time will address the big issues of our time. The imperative for sharing knowledge and understanding across national boundaries, political and language barriers has been clear in ISA and RC34 from its post-war start, and in the twenty first century the need for organisations which will take carriage of such a mission becomes even clearer.

Research Committee 34 Activity Report 2014 2018 for Europe

Vice-Presidents for Europe: Maurice Devlin and Natalia Waechter

Following ideas from the RC34 four-year plan, the European activities focused on organizing and implementing conferences, thereby also cooperating with further academic organisations. Most important to mention is the collaboration with the RN30 (Research Network on Youth and Generation) from the European Sociological Association. The previous RC34 four-year plan (2010-2014) led to an improvement in relationships between the two networks/committees after years of distance and lack of cooperation.

3rd Maynooth International Youth Studies Conference

This progress was consolidated in 2015 when for the first time there was an international youth studies conference that was billed as being jointly in association with both RC34 and RN30. The conference was organized by Maurice Devlin and the Centre for Youth Research and Development at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth. It was attended not only by international youth researchers and local youth workers and students, but also by twenty social work students who came with Natalia Waechter from the University of Graz, Austria. As such it was also a productive collaboration between the two RC34 Vice-Presidents for Europe.

ESA RN 30 Mid-term Conference 2017, in association with ISA RC 34

The cooperation between RC34 and RN34 bore further fruit in January 2017, when RN30s "mid-term conference" in Ericeira, Portugal was officially labelled "in association with ISA RC34" and brought together youth studies scholars from both ESA and ISA. RN30 mid-term conferences are deliberately designed as relatively small events in non-urban locations, allowing for greater contact and interaction between participants, meaning that there will hopefully be enhanced collaboration and cooperation in future.

Third ISA Forum Vienna 2016

Finally, the Third ISA Forum convened in Vienna, Austria, 10-14 July 2016 on the theme "The Futures We Want: Global Sociology and the Struggles for a Better World." Being the local host, Natalia Waechter organized informal meetings and connected to the Austrian Ministry of Families and Youth who was always interested and supportive of international youth research and well aware of RC34. The "Youth Competence Centre" of the Ministry organized the event "Future directions in international youth work and youth research", bringing together actors from youth politics and scholars in youth studies from different organisations (above all RC34 and the Spanish-speaking youth research community).

Research Committee 34 Activity Report from Asia

A Report on the International Conference on RC34 / RC53 partnered activity: "Life Skills and Well-being of Children and Youth in the Digital World"

An International Conference of Indian Association of Life Skills Education (IALSE) on Life Skills and Well-being of Children and Youth in Digital World in support with Research Committee of Sociology of Youth RC34 and Research Committee of Sociology of Childhood RC53, ISA was jointly organized by Sri Jai Narain Post Graduate College Lucknow and Circle for Child and Youth Research Cooperation in India (CCYRCI) during 9-11 February 2018 in Lucknow, INDIA.

Three day Conference was attended by scholars and researchers of Youth and Childhood studies from twelve countries US, Denmark, UK, Australia, South Africa, The Netherlands, Germany, Brazil, UAE, Philippines, Sri Lanka and twenty one states of India. Dr Ani Wierenga, Prof Maurice Devlin, Jayanathan Govender and Kiran Odhav are some of the RC 34 members who have actively participated in the Conference.

Out of total 234 submitted abstracts, 170 abstracts were accepted for oral presentation in nineteen technical sessions. Eight Panel discussions and two symposiums were organized during the Conference in which eminent researchers and established scholars were invited to present their views. The Conference was organized in two symposiums, eight panel discussions in which 56 invited speakers have presented their views. In Nineteen technical sessions, total 142 scholars have presented their papers in these technical sessions.

The Conference was inaugurated on 9th February 2018 by Dr A K Dubey, Secretary of Government of India in the Department of Youth Affairs. Prof S P Singh, the Vice Chancellor of Lucknow University was the Guest of Honour. Prof Hanne Warming of Roskilde University Denmark have presented her key-note address while Dr Vinod Chandra has introduced the theme of the Conference. Sri V N Misra has presided the Function. Prof S D Sharma, Principal of the College welcomed the guest. From the RC34 Board, Dr Ani Wierenga and Prof Maurice Devlin provided inputs and chaired sessions, including chairing a symposium on Youth in BRICS Countries.

The Valedictory session was held in the evening of 11th February 2018 and Prof Deepak Kumar Behera, Vice-Chancellor of Sambalpur University, Odisha has delivered his valedictory address. Sri V N Misra, President of the Management Committee of Sri JNPG College was the Chief Guest. Prof S D Sharma welcomed the guests and Dr Vinod Chandra has presented his report. At the end of the function Mr Anshumali Sharma has presented the formal vote of thanks to all the guests and participants.

A Cultural evening was organized by Ms Aparna Tiwari and her team. The Indian Classical and Folk dances were performed by Ms Shambhavi Tiwari, Pallavi Sharma and Vijay Laxmi. Songs

were sung by Dr Durgesh Upadhaya of AMITY University Lucknow and many other artists. The evening was enjoyed by all the participants who have joined in the dance at the end of the function. It was followed by the dinner.
