**EDITORIAL**

**Dan:** Oh yes! It was much warmer than it might read on paper. And I think that's a much a mark of the strength and welcoming nature of the RC than how many papers we have.



The book contributes to retracing the elaboration of the corpus of theoretical and methodological approaches, themes and perspectives of analysis from which contemporary research on youth cultures originates. From the privileged vantage point of sociology, the book revisits landmark moments in research on youth cultures: the analytical pathway developed by the Chicago School of Sociology on young people living in the urban mosaic; the background, contents and (in)actuality of Karl Mannheim's perspective on generations; the broad debate around the distinctive features of "youth culture" looping back around to Talcott Parsons; the analysis on youth, dissent and counterculture developed by Goodman, Roszak and Keniston; the research on youth subcultures carried out by the CCCS at Birmingham University.

Current Sociology, the official quartely journal of the *International Sociological Association*, and one of the oldest and most widely cited sociology journals in the world, is currently looking for new editors.

The current Editors of Current Sociology, Karim Murji and Sarah Neal, will complete their term of service at the end of June 2024. The ISA is now seeking expressions of interest for this position. The new editor (or editors) will take on responsibilities from July 2024. The term of office is three years, with the possibility of renewal (for two years, plus a further two years). Below is further information on the journal, the tasks associated with the editorship, and instructions on how to submit your expression of interest.

Current Sociology, an official journal of the International Sociological Association, is one of the world's most widely cited sociology journals. Published five times a year in English, with abstracts in Spanish and French, Current Sociology is fully peer-reviewed. It publishes original research and innovative critical commentary on current debates within sociology as a developing discipline and on the contribution that sociologists can make to understanding and influencing issues arising in a globalizing world. In recent years, there have also been occasional special 'themed sub-sections' and 'dialogues' within the regular issues. The journal welcomes papers by sociologists from all over the world.

The editor(s) should have a vision of the kinds of themes and debates that reflect the dynamic developments of the ISA and contribute to the advancement of sociology. The main responsibility is managing the receipt and review process, with the help of an Editorial Board made up of well-known sociologists from different continents, and compiling the issues of Current Sociology.

#### RESEARCHING YOUTH ON THE MOVE: METHODS, ETHICS AND EMOTIONS

A special issue of Social Sciences (ISSN 2076-0760) as part of the section "Childhood and Youth Studies»

The sociology of the youth and youth cultures has left its youthful stage and has entered a phase of maturity. Since the mid-20th century, the youth in general, and youth cultures as an expression of identity that goes beyond the age group, have been studied as a metaphor for social change, the condensed image of a post-industrial society in transformation. During the first quarter of the 21st century, the digital world has been incorporated as a space for cultural expression and creativity, in which young people act as the vanguard of technological, social and mental transformations that are then transferred to the whole social body. Today, new generations of researchers from different social science fields (sociology, anthropology, social psychology, communication, education, etc.) are exploring youth cultures as a privileged research laboratory, where they can listen to emerging social trends. Nevertheless, research on youth implies important methodological and ethical challenges that are comparatively less shared and discussed. The field of methodology in youth research is still in need of improvement, development and critical reflections.

The purpose of this Special Issue is to compile the results of recent research on youth and youth cultures, from the perspective of the "toolbox" used and reflections on research methodologies and techniques, whether qualitative, quantitative or mixed. It also will collect articles on ethics protocols and emotional involvement in fieldwork research with young people.

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# DATA AVAILABILITY

#### NEWS FROM THE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT STUDY

Principal Investigators: Jeylan T. Mortimer, University of Minnesota

The Youth Development Study (YDS) addresses many topics of interest to sociologists, social psychologists, developmental psychologists, criminologists, and life course scholars. Data from the 20th survey of YDS G2 participants, and the 4th survey of G3 participants is now available at the ICPSR (Inter-university Center for Political and Social Research, University of Michigan), along with prior data from the study, at <a href="https://www.icpsr.umich.edu/web/ICPSR/studies/24881">https://www.icpsr.umich.edu/web/ICPSR/studies/24881</a>.

The Youth Development Study (YDS) was initiated in 1988 as a school-based study of adolescent children and their parents to examine the consequences of formative experiences in adolescence for mental health, value formation, educational achievement, and multiple facets of behavioral adjustment. Particular attention was directed to the impacts of early work experiences, parent-child and peer relationships, and experiences in school. As the study continued, the focus shifted to the transition to adulthood, adult development, intergenerational mobility and, most recently, mid-life adjustment and health. This comprehensive longitudinal study encompasses three generations: a cohort studied from adolescence to mid-life (G2, 1988-2019), their parents (G1, 1988, 1991), and their adolescent children (G3, 2009-2011, 2020). Data from three generations in the same families enable study of intergenerational relationships and differences in the experience of adolescence and transition to adulthood across parent and child cohorts.

### History

The ISA was founded 1948 in close cooperation with UNESCO's Research Department. As peace education and youth #s were in the forefront of the postwar, socio-political legacy of this foundation, many of the first officers of ISA were also youth sociologists. But in 1975 the RC34 was established as a specialized branch of ISA.

The RC34 was from the beginning not only a network for pure academic youth research, but also committed to the original heritage of social and political responsibility. This implies standing partnership with multilateral organisations aiming at conflict resolution, peace and the development of civic society. It is also the policy of RC 34 to invite for membership and participation colleagues from other disciplines as well as practitioners in the youth fields, and then to serve as a global, interdisciplinary network and meeting place for youth #s in general.





#### Structure

The Committee is built on associational principles of individual membership, formal statutes, a General Meeting every fourth year at the World Congresses, also electing a Board running the RC between the Congresses.

The work is built on regional Vice-Presidencies running their activities and networking in various areas of the world, and a Bureau taking care of the membership services and general, strategic affairs connected to the Presidency. An Advisory Board is appointed by the Board, as a body for special experiences and strategic competence in the field.

### **Objectives**

The aim of RC34 is to contribute to the development of theory and practice of youth sociology and youth research on an international level, uniting professional knowledge, scientific consciousness, and social commitment of its members to work on problems and #s of youth on a local, regional, and international level.
